

A bit of history...

Strasbourg's many walls and fortifications bear witness to the city's important role as a stronghold. After 1870, as a replacement for the Specklin and Vauban fortifications. deemed obsolete, two new lines of defence were erected: an 11 km city wall, and a ring of 19 advanced forts (16 in France, 3 in Germany).

Built while Alsace-Lorraine was part of the German Empire under Wilhelm I, the forts initially bore the names of key German politicians and military leaders, until they were re-named after 1918 in honour of French generals and marshals.

The different forts, fortified structures, shelters and casemates are camouflaged under a canopy of black locust, chestnut and walnut trees.

Over the years, most of the forts have become completely overgrown, and only 4 are now open to the public, Fort Rapp (Moltke), Fort Frère (Baden), Fort Kléber (Bismarck) and the fortified Ducrot (Podbielski) structure. Exploring these forts combines history with pleasure, a path of discovery that is both fascinating and fun.

...Nature in abundance!

The Forts Trail is also an opportunity for cyclists to enjoy the diversity of the surrounding landscape, from the cool forest atmosphere to the shade of a café terrace, and from half-timbered buildings to lock-keepers' houses, as they play

leap-frog over the Rhine, or stop for a picnic within the fortified walls.

The Forts Trail can also be accessed from the city centre or via the cycle tracks that run along the Marne/ Rhine, Bruche and Rhône/Rhine canals. Discover shorter or longer sections of the Trail at your own pace, without any major diffi-

culty, with family or friends.

One trail, four themes

NATURE AND LANDSCAPES

From Fort Rapp (Moltke) to the banks of the River III, discover the distinctive landscape and flora of the Alsatian Ried, the Robertsau Forest and its bird reserve...

CROSS-BORDER

Celebrate the friendship uniting France and Germany, as the Trail passes first through the German town of Kehl, then winds its way through the bucolic scenery of the Ortenau forests, orchards and fields before crossing back into France via the forts Hoche (Schwarzhoff), Uhrich-Hoche (Werder-Schwarzhoff) and Uhrich (Werder).

SMALL TOWNS

This more urban section of the Forts Trail is just as exciting, as cyclists discover Illkirch-Graffenstaden, Ostwald, Lingolsheim and Eckbolsheim, all with sights worth seeing (eg. Château de l'Ill or the Joffre/Sachsen Fort in Holtzheim).

HILLSIDE AND HERITAGE

From Wolfisheim to Souffelweyersheim, enjoy a unique view from the heights of the Hausbergen villages over the Kochersberg and city of Strasbourg, with many forts along the way (Kléber/Bismarck, Frère/Baden, Foch/Kronprinz, Ducrot/Podbielski and Desaix/Roon).

How to pick up the Forts Trail

How to pick up the Forts Trail:

On cycle tracks

Via EuroVelo 15 - the Rhine cycle route

- > In France: to the north, from La Wantzenau and to the south in Illkirch, at the level of the Uhrich Fort
- > In Germany: to the north, in Auenheim, and to the south, at the Pierre Pfimlin bridge over the Rhine

Via l'EuroVelo 5 – Via Romea Francigena

- > To the north: in Souffelweyersheim, via the Marne-au-Rhin canal
- > To the west: in Wolfisheim, via the Bruche canal

By tram


9 tram stops are handy for the Forts Trail:

- > Line A: Ducs d'Alsace, Hautepierre Maillon, Illkirch Lixenbuhl.
- > Line B: Hoenheim Gare, Le Ried, Elmerforst, Borie, **Alouettes**
- > Line E: Robertsau Boecklin Bicycles are not allowed on the tram during peak hours (7 to 9 am and 5 to 7 pm).

By train


No bike? Not to worry, think Vélhop!
